

RE-DISCOVERING THE VIGAN VERNACULAR

For two months, between September and October 2007, I was fortunate to have been sent by the UNESCO office in Bangkok to serve as technical editor and on-site coordinator for a publication that the International organization is spearheading. The book, *The Vigan Heritage Homeowner's Manual*, is a component of a multi-pronged approach UNESCO is applying to facilitate culture-based sustainable economic development in the Asia-Pacific region.

First, let me state a brief background on why this book is being published. For the past 15 years, UNESCO-Bangkok has been instrumental in advocating and implementing statutory protection for the 200-year old structures in Vigan. It played an advisory role in the nomination and successful listing of Vigan in UNESCO's World Heritage Sites list. Recently, it has chosen Vigan along with eight other Asian traditional urban sites as part of a broad, multi-sectoral program in increasing local capacity in caretaking of its cultural assets while deriving economic benefits from these assets. This program included symposiums and training in heritage and local tourism management, and facilitating revival of traditional building skills that might have otherwise been lost due to changing cultural tastes and demographics.

Technology in 1961 and later obtained a Master in Geodetic Science from Ohio State University.

After graduating from Mapua, La Putt joined the Corps of Engineers of the Armed Forces of the Philippines in 1961 and taught at the Philippine Military Academy for 17 yrs. He later taught at his alma mater and at the University of Baguio, before moving to Hawaii with his family in 1987.

La Putt took a teaching job at Honolulu Community College and then worked for the City and County of Honolulu, where he was appointed to the position of Building Official for the Building Department. La Putt worked for the City until retiring in July 2005.

La Putt helped to establish the Filipino-American League of Engineers and Architects (FALEA) in 1993 and served as its first president. In 2001, he received the Outstanding Civil Engineer Award from FALEA.

He subsequently joined the Hawaii Council of Engineering Societies – the umbrella organization for the 13 Engineering Association and societies in Hawaii that together comprise over 3,000 members. He was elected chair in 1999 – the first Filipino to hold the position in the organizations 46 year history.

One of La Putts most recent accomplishment is organizing the Hawaii Association of Mapua Alumni, which currently has 33 members.

Vigan's historic houses, considered the crown jewels in this heritage city's uniquely well-preserved architectural landscape, are still inhabited as dwelling spaces. However, most homeowners may not be aware of proper building methods while undertaking repairs to, or—more often—re-using their homes for more contemporary purposes. The publication is intended to serve as an all-in-one guide, resource, and advisory manual on the proper standards and repair techniques while helping to preserve the authentic qualities of Vigan homes. The hope is it will also become a catalyst in training local builders to become much-needed professionals in historic building repair and maintenance.

It is under this context that I started my journey to Vigan. Part of the excitement is finally experiencing the remarkable streetscape I have only seen as settings in period movies. What is unique for Vigan is the uninterrupted array of colonial structures and houses running for several street blocks, a rarity today in the Philippines. Helping to organize a book on heritage homes of Vigan is the icing on the cake, as writing and historic architecture are two of my main interests.

After an 8 hour bus trip from Manila (the airstrip in Vigan is big enough only for private propeller planes) I was picked up at the bus station by a representative from Mayor Eva Marie Singson Medina's office. I was billeted at a beach front, 2-story hotel in Baranggay Mindoro, a 10-minute drive from the *poblacion*, with amazing views of the South China sea in the morning and at sunset. It was wonderful to watch, while eating my breakfast, white herons fly close to the sea shore to pluck out *their* breakfast.

For the next 2 months, I went to work daily in historic City Hall, in an office right beside the Mayor's, who by the way, refused to stay alone in her office and instead set up a work desk right in the middle of her staff's office, where she receives the daily visitors and resolves city matters right then and there. The indefatigable Mayor has probably done more for the preservation and strengthening civic pride of the City's cultural heritage than all of her predecessors combined. She implemented the first comprehensive 'cultural mapping' of the City's cultural resources, rehabilitated and dredged the old canals that linked old Vigan to the sea, set up the country's only second organic waste conversion facility, obtained funding to convert a colonial-era school into an auditorium and exhibition space, and is now funding

The publication of the Vigan Manual which will be then distributed free to the homeowners of historic houses. Her culture-centered reach for an ecologically and economically viable Vigan resulted in the construction of a community park where a future children's museum—the only one outside of Manila—is planned. She is well-connected to a political clan, but is at the same time well respected because of her programs, and genuine grassroots concern for the preservation of the City's historic core. I was surprised to notice that, on numerous lunches held at her house, the fence gate were unlocked and always wide open. But not surprisingly, I found out her undergraduate degree was in Architecture from UST. While locals I spoke with claimed that Vigan was as good as a ghost town 10 years ago, its "main street" today is busy and crowded during working hours, with choking emissions from numerous tricycles serving as main mode of public transport. During Holy Week, local visitors arrive by the busloads, visit the centuries-old Cathedral (where I walked up to the space above the altar) and keep the many old houses converted to inns and restaurants full. Across the main plaza, where the country's oldest memorial marker stood, and where Gabriela Silang was hanged—a new, low-scale commercial mall designed in vernacular of the traditional houses was built. The 18th c. girl's Catholic school has been sensitively converted into a series of shops, where I make my daily run for *merienda* while at work on the book. Speaking of *merienda*, I had my fill trying on a daily basis, local delicacies such as Vigan's version of *empanada* (deep fried dough filled with veggie and local longganisa), *pancit miki*, and the dangerously addicting *bagnet* (twice baked pork). After months of "fresh and lean" cuisine from Thailand, I was back in home style, comfort food. Staffers at City Hall usually order the *miki* by 3 pm. It's not necessarily a healthy habit, but since I am working on traditional houses, why resist the total "traditional" experience?

Awareness of the city's architectural heritage is high among its residents, and they are proud of the special role that Vigan plays in the wider context of Philippine conservation efforts. The historic zone has antique and handicraft shops, but also a large grocery store inserted within an old rice granary building. In spite of the strides they had taken, Biguenos retained their simple affability and straightforward friendliness one often finds only when we travel out of big cities. During a baranggay fiesta,

Manang Eva and her cohort took me to several houses where she was invited to. Okay—it was just another excuse for binge eating. Ever tried having lunch three times in a row? By the fifth house, I can only gobble on the dessert.

Oh—the book. Most of my days were spent editing the raw manuscript, correcting technical flaws, adding new texts or compressing superfluous ones, coordinating the needed photos with the local photographer, planning and generating the graphic contents, and doing mock layouts for the pages. Sometimes I had to do some photo shoots of houses myself, which I did not mind because it meant access to some of the city’s most historic properties. During my last week, I made a Power Point presentation of the progress of our work to the City council as part of their Children’s Day celebrations.

Unfortunately, there is still much to be done, and my time to return to Bangkok, and soon back to my firm in Hawaii come up. In between walking along the genteel, cobble stoned street of Crisologo, where only horse-drawn carriages are allowed, and where you are hemmed in by magnificent, centuries-old houses, and visiting some house-museums such as the exquisitely restored Sequia Mansion, I was also able to visit two houses under (somewhat massive) reconstruction and conversion. I was able to speak with a local conservation architect and spoke with concerned homeowner in the historic zone on why he cannot convert his house into a modern one. I happily managed day trips to the two other World Heritage churches namely Sta Maria Church and Paoay Church in Ilocos Norte. Truly, this is an architectural blitzkrieg trip like no other. The Manual, now under final editing and layouting stages, will hopefully be published this summer.

Editors Note: In February 2007, FALEA member Ernie T. Endrina, AIA was accepted as a Professional Volunteer /Intern at the UNESCO Regional Office for Culture in Asia-Pacific (RACAP) in Bangkok, Thailand. Taking leave from his job at Architects Hawai’I Ltd., he worked as Associate editor and Project coordinator for two UNESCO publications on culture and heritage management in the region.
